

School Governor profile

After leaving frontline education, I joined the Institute of Education at Warwick University where I spent several happy years training and supporting the teachers of the future, until taking full retirement in 2016. I enjoy watching sport, gardening, volunteering at the Percival Guildhouse Adult Learning Centre and taking Adult Education courses myself.

I am happy to still be involved in the world of education and feel privileged to be a governor at such a caring and successful school. Last year I enjoyed finding out about the amazing work of the Early Years Foundation Stage department, particularly focusing on how very young children are taught in Nursery and Reception. I also helped Ms Shipp and Mrs. Hopper with the afterschool Eco Club every Wednesday in the Spring Term. The weeds in the raised borders had no chance once the enthusiastic young gardeners started digging!

In the remaining two terms of this academic year, I am looking forward to visiting again to monitor how the school is improving in terms of pupil performance and progress and also Personal Development, Behaviour and Welfare. It is a pleasure to work with such skilled and dedicated staff.

Bad Weather

Although this part of the school year is called the Spring Term, at this point we are still definitely in the grip of winter weather which brings the obvious challenges of ice and snow. Road conditions can sometimes be very poor, causing dangerous situations for both drivers and pedestrians. It is worth reminding parents and guardians that, in the worst conditions, the school may have to be closed. The decision to close the school is never taken lightly and it is made by the head teacher who applies common sense in assessing the various risks involved.

The aim is always to keep the school open whenever it is safe to do so. As the welfare of children is paramount, the head teacher will consider several important factors such as whether the children can get to and from school safely, that the site is safe and that there are enough staff to supervise the pupils. Usually, the majority of staff would be travelling much further to school than the pupils.

Once the decision to close has been made, the school will immediately notify parents/guardians, the Local Authority and the Department of Education. Parents/ guardians will be informed by text message, school website and Rugby FM radio who broadcast regular updates on school closures. If we do suffer a period of heavy snowfall, please be aware that a school emergency closure might be necessary. Thank you.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE DURING TERM TIME UPDATED INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council.

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.

Your child's progress academically as well as socially is our shared priority

Warwickshire Primary School pupils recorded 29,703 half day sessions of absence due to holiday in the Autumn/Spring term during the academic year 2017/18. This is an increase of 6,256 on the previous year.
